## Dear Friends of Sherwood and Mt. Home United Methodist Churches

I have been praying continually that you would each be kept whole and healthy in this time of social distancing. I hope that the disruptions to ordinary routines are not causing you hardship and I'm mindful of the many ways this is impacting our communities and people all over the world. I think not only of those who are ill, and those who will become ill, but also the people out of work, the children out of school, the financial instability this will cause to so many people and everything that flows from that.

On the other hand I have

witnessed how much kinder and attentive people have become in the midst of this confusion. Each time I've interacted with a stranger this past week they've paused to ask me how I'm doing in a sincere tone and shared a piece of their own story they certainly would not have offered in ordinary times. The human longing for community and connection, and the spirit of compassion and solidarity is powerful.

Because we cannot gather in worship and must remain in solitude this Sunday I invite you to reflect on this piece of the story of Elijah from 1 Kings 19:

Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done, how he had killed all Baal's prophets with the sword. Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah with this message: "May the gods do whatever they want to me if by this time tomorrow I haven't made your life like the life of one of them."

Elijah was terrified. He got up and ran for his life. He arrived at Beersheba in Judah and left his assistant there. He himself went farther on into the desert a day's journey. He finally sat down under a solitary broom bush. He longed for his own death: "It's more than enough, Lord! Take my life because I'm no better than my ancestors." He lay down and slept under the solitary broom bush.

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Then suddenly a messenger tapped him and said to him, "Get up! Eat something!" Elijah opened his eyes and saw flatbread baked on glowing coals and a jar of water right by his head. He ate and drank, and then went back to sleep. The Lord's messenger returned a second time and tapped him. "Get up!" the messenger said. "Eat something, because you have a difficult road ahead of you." Elijah got up, ate and drank, and went refreshed by that food for forty days and nights until he arrived at Horeb, God's mountain. There he went into a cave and spent the night.

Stories of God caring for God's people in the wilderness are everywhere in scripture. In this particular interlude Elijah flees danger into the wilderness, fearing for his life. He expects to die there, but God gave him food, drink, and rest. By tradition it was the birds, the ravens who fed Elijah, and this image of God's sustaining care has especially informed monastic and hermetic traditions down through the centuries.

There is a mysterious kind of sustenance to be found in solitude with God, but many of us avoid solitude. Sitting quietly with one's self can be a very hard thing to do. We may be assailed with doubts, fears, guilt, or shame. We may find ourselves recalling painful memories, or unhelpfully analyzing our past choices and behaviors in ways that are painful. We may become

bored, and out of boredom make poor choices regarding our self-care. Boredom often drives us to distraction and consumption.

But every spiritual tradition in the world contains advice to spend time in solitude, to meditate, to journey inward and to study our own soul. When we ignore this advice we stunt our own spiritual development. We trap ourselves in counterproductive behaviors and rob ourselves of the wisdom and maturity we are intended to attain through communion with the holy spirit.

So may you breathe deeply and slowly. May you rest in the wilderness. May you be sustained by God's loving presence, and may you be refreshed for the road ahead.
