An Advent of Rest

Advent is a time of preparation for the world is about to change. The world imagined by colonizers and capitalists is doomed. It is ending. Today I don't want to focus on the short term chaos this will cause. I want to think about the rest that lays on the other side of this ending.

Rest, true rest, is almost impossible to imagine within capitalism. Rest in our society is something we have to account for; something instrumental to productivity. Some of us have to justify our rest as "earned" and show our receipts, metering out moments of quiet for ourselves like misers, while others luxuriate sinfully in rest predicated on the exploitation of the earth and their neighbors. For many, rest is hemmed in by the constant awareness of how precarious survival is in our culture. Our shopping trips take us past encampments of the unhoused. Our vacations land us on beaches where poverty is hidden, but not really, from our sight.

Take a moment and imagine a restful life. A life lived in community, where there is no

fear of expulsion or lack, because resources are shared and everyone controls the fruits of their labor for the benefit of the whole. A life where you don't wonder if your present ease will compromise your future security because you know who will care for you in your infirmity, not because they owe you, but because mutual -care is the basis of your life together.

Imagine a life in harmony with your ecosystem, and the non-human persons that share your region, such that all that you need is received as a gift, and you understand your labor not as being a matter of earning your keep, but as a matter of returning thanks to the earth. Imagine even one full breath cycle, inhaleexhale, which didn't need to be justified in anyway to yourself or anyone else, because you are not your 'self' an isolated monad, but a part of a community and you inhale and exhale the same air, the same spirit, as everything around you, receiving and giving life effortlessly and continuously.

ing childhoods. A jubilee of dignified elderhood. A jubilee of reforestation. A jubilee of restored salmon runs. A jubilee of quiet gardening. There will be rest for us and for our descendants when we finally put this world of domination and greed to rest.

Reconciling Committee Update

- The rainbow flag down by the church sign seems to be holding its own. We've only needed to replace it when it gets weathered, not because it's missing. Early next year, we will be looking at the possibility of adding a Progress Pride flag. The Progress Pride flag adds black and brown stripes to represent marginalized LGBTQ+ communities of color, along with the colors pink, light blue, and white, which are used on the Transgender Pride flag.
- As you may remember, after adopting our Reconciling Welcoming Statement back in 2019, our plan was to next explore becoming a Reconciling Congregation. Then, COVID got in the way. After the first of the year, we'll be looking at taking this next step and you'll be hearing more.
- Sadly, for the last two years, COVID also interfered with the Reconciling Committee's plans to participate in the Beaverton Pride Parade. This year we learned that Newberg's very active PFLAG (formally Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) group has a Car Pride Parade a good option for us in 2022 and a great way to show our support for the beleaguered LGBTQ+ community in Newberg and surrounding areas.
- After the first of the year, the Reconciling Committee will be working with Val (Mt. Home's Safe Sanctuary Coordinator) to explore adding LGBTQ+ considerations to our Safe Sanctuary policy.
- Lastly, we refer you to the Lay Leader's article elsewhere in this newsletter for an update on General Conference and the continued divide in the United Methodist Church over full inclusion in the church for the LGBTQ+ community.




