An Abolitionist Hymn

During the Christmas Eve service this year I sang one of my favorite hymns for this time of year, "O Holy Night". It's a famous tune. The lyrics were written in French by Placide Cappeau de Roquemaure, and the music was composed by Adolphe Charles Adams who was Jewish. The song was at first resisted by the church as "too modern" but it became so popular in France that eventually the church conceded. An American Unitarian minister named John Sullivan Dwight wrote the English translation in 1855 and it quickly became both very popular and very controversial here.

Both the popularity and the controversy were due to the lyrics of the third verse which read:

Truly He taught us to love one another His law is love and His gospel is peace Chains shall He break for the slave is our brother And in His name all oppression shall cease

Abolitionists in the United States took this hymn as a kind of anthem for their cause, while slave-owners complained to their pastors that it was "too political". Some things never change.

Even today the 3rd verse of this hymn is often left out of recordings and performances, but in my estimation these words encapsulate what is so radical and important about Christmas. If we really believe what Christmas purports to be true - that God took flesh and came to dwell among the poor, then we must see that the cause of the enslaved, the refugee, the houseless person, indeed of every oppressed person is the cause of God. To follow God and worship God is to take sides against oppression everywhere. If God's law is love, and God's gospel is peace, then every law or power which breeds cruelty and war must end.

O Holy Night is a dangerous hymn for a dangerous feast. May you keep the feast holy until all the chains have at last been broke.

It is always a joy to work with my colleagues, like-minded dear friends.

I'm in awe to experience the wonder of God to see that we are assure of food. When we are out of cereal then a 'miracle' cereal is donated. Or soup, spaghetti or tuna.

Target Company has contracted with OFB to donate meat/canned goods/yogurt/coffee, tea & beverage. Willowbrook pantry has Sherwood Target to obtain these foods & beverage. Target has been a godsend for the pantry.

The cleaning of the pantry is donated time from the Friends Community Church. What a wonderful group of people. They come once a month to clean the pantry.
