Why Are People Poor?



"When I give food to the poor, they call me a saint. When I ask why the poor have no food, they call me a communist." Archbishop Helder Camara.

God's creation can support all of God's creatures. This is bedrock theology. God didn't make a world where, by design, some people must be deprived of shelter, food, and water. This means that where we see such suffering we are seeing evidence of something having gone wrong.

The self-serving explanation of the comfortable in our society is that poverty is the fault of the poor themselves. The appeal of this explanation is that it is simple and requires nothing of those of us who are financially stable. If we blame poverty on poor life choices, then we can rest easy believing the world is fundamentally fair. People get what they deserve.

But, of course, people do NOT get what they deserve. The hardest working

people in our society are often the poorest farm workers, service workers, custodians. While some of the wealthiest people earn such incredible sums of money that it is ludicrous to suppose they are "worth" that many times more than others whatever their supposed talents. Ultimately, no one deserves poverty. No one deserves to be unsheltered. No one deserves to die of starvation or exposure.

Another possible explanation is that poverty is like a natural disaster - a seemingly random thing which happens to people without respect to background. It rains on the just and the unjust alike. It is true that some famines have natural causes. Droughts and floods can make resources scarce.

But we can also see clearly that we are living in the most abundant period in human history. There is more than enough food to feed everyone. Even in Portland there are more empty housing units than houseless people. We can also see that poverty is not random - that people of color, and people from the global south are disproportionately deprived of necessities. Furthermore, we can see that some people have extreme amounts of excess and this should make it clear to us that poverty is NOT natural, but manufactured.

So if God's creation provides

Proverbs 16:9 In their hearts humans plan heir course, but the LORD establishes their steps.

"If you want to make God laugh," so goes a meme, "make plans!"

enough for all, and poverty on the whole doesn't arise due to the individual choices of the poor or by cosmic accident, then we have to entertain the answer which both scripture and historical analysis offer: poverty is a consequence of unjust social systems which exploit many people for the benefit of a few. Poverty is the shadow of wealth.

Consider: all food and all resources come from the earth. In a natural state, if the earth was providing adequate food for everyone no one could be prevented from feeding themself. They could simply pluck the fruit from the tree, or the fish from the river. What prevents this are cultural and legal concepts of ownership. A hungry person can't just go get the food from the earth, because the land is enclosed and its resources hoarded. Even if there was a famine in one region nothing would prevent people from migrating to other more abundant places were it not for the human constructs of borders and nationalities. What prevents houseless people from simply occupying the empty housing units that are all around our cities? Laws and norms which say that it is acceptable for people to die of cold every winter and of heat every summer, while vacation rentals and investment properties sit empty for the profit of their owners.

This enclosure and hoarding of resources which deprives the poor of bread to eat and clothes to wear is theft. God made enough for all, but it isn't getting fairly distributed. This is why Jesus says it is impossible for a wealthy person to get into the kingdom of God, and why the prophets of the Hebrew Bible spend so much of their time excoriating the nations for failing to care for the poor. The existence of both poverty and wealth is an indictment on society. A just society has neither poor nor wealthy people, but

everyone's needs are met and all thrive together.

We ought to ask, if the enclosure and hoarding of resources that creates poverty is so obviously unfair, and the poor outnumber the wealthy, why is this situation tolerated? Aside from the incredible power which the upper classes wield through governments, policing, and military, the answer to this question is that many (perhaps most) of the poor in our society do not conceive of ourselves as such. Most of us are closer to being homeless than to being billionaires, but we do not relate to our neighbors sleeping outside and see ourselves as having common cause. Instead, many of us have been convinced that we have enough to lose that we are better off spending our energy protecting our modest level of comfort than attempting to build a just society. The working class is divided - and not by accident.

This is perhaps the darkest underlying truth of why people are poor: poverty exists to keep those of us who are a few steps above poverty working and cooperative with a system we know is exploitative. The maintenance of an obviously unjust wealth distribution partially relies on many of us being convinced that things could always be worse. There is someone who has it worse than we do, and that is both a threat and a comfort designed to encourage us to keep upholding myths of bootstraps and self-made millionaires and American dreams. No one would work for minimum wage if they had any choice. Camps of houseless people around the city are there to remind people why they should accept an inadequate wage. That is why people are poor.
